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## A SUCCESSFUL JOURNEY A YEAR IN THE MAKING

During the summer of 2023, a community needs assessment conducted by the Akron Community Foundation identified housing and the concern around homelessness as the number one issue in our community, a direct result of the lack of affordable housing options in Northeast Ohio.

This trend has also manifested itself at ACCESS, where following the COVID-19 pandemic, the average length of stay for residents has increased to 91 days with some residents needing up to a year before exiting to permanent housing, residents such as Kyrah.

26-years-old and pregnant with her fifth child, she found out that she was no longer able to stay with family members and had many barriers that prevented her from seeking housing on her own accord.

One-by-one her case manager helped her work through each barrier

However, after giving birth, Kyrah returned from the hospital, but ACCESS staff soon noticed a marked change in her demeanor, and she began showing signs of postpartum depression. She talked about how her children would be better off without her, and became detached from the community she had built in the shelter. Her case manager and the shelter's health and wellness coordinator counseled her to talk to a doctor.

With support and medication, Kyrah was able to return to her joyful demeanor, extremely aware of what could have happened without the staff at ACCESS.

"I am the way I am now because I had to go through this. I now realize the villiage that I thought I had at home was not really a village, because I had a great village at ACCESS," said Kyrah.

In her year at ACCESS, Kyrah had the space to grow, and obtained the necessary skills, through the classes and programming being offered at ACCESS, to find and move into a new home for her and her family.

"I feel like I've grown," added Kyrah. "Really transitioning to, not so much a young adulthood, but to 'adulting'. I had to go through that at ACCESS."

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#### ACCESS CELEBRATES 40 YEARS OF SERVICE IN SUMMIT COUNTY

For many, changing the calendar from 2023 to 2024 is a time for a new beginning and new opportunities, but at ACCESS 2024 is a time to celebrate. This year, we are celebrating our 40 years of service in Summit County!

"ACCESS is truly humbled and excited to be celebrating our 40th anniversary in 2024!" said Jackie Hemsworth, executive director. "From our humble beginnings in 1984 to the present day, we are honored by all of the support we have received and continue to receive. We look forward to celebrating this special milestone with everyone in the community because we have all played a part in helping to serve more than 23,000 residents on their journey toward the attainment of permanent housing. As our anniversary slogan states, "There's no place like home!"

ACCESS' began on September 14, 1984, when the former nun convent buildings of St. Bernard's Catholic Church in downtown Akron were converted into a shelter for women and children experiencing homelessness.

The move to our current location at 230 West Market Street occurred in 1996 in order to meet the growing needs of the community. The new location increased availability in the shelter by 43%.

Today, ACCESS currently has 15 rooms for women, and women with children, who are experiencing homelessness. The shelter also includes a kitchen and dining room, where residents are served breakfast, lunch and
